Getting feedback or coaching on your teaching



Providing one-on-one instruction or tutoring students



Analyzing patterns in student learning or achievement data



Administrative work (e.g., paperwork, emails, reports)



Grading and/or providing feedback on assignments or assessments



Supplementing your instruction



Modifying materials to meet student needs



Making assessments, quizzes or exit tickets



Making worksheets, assignments, projects or activities



Preparing to teach (e.g., planning lessons, reviewing instructional materials)
